Bee Senses

Did you know that bees have five eyes and yet their vision is 100 times worse than ours? That was one of the many interesting facts we learned from our Vice-Chairman, John Hendrie in his talk 'Senses of the Honey Bee' at our October meeting. He explained that a lot of petals look dull to us but the bees can see lines that will guide them to the nectar.

If you have stood by your hives and seen bees that appear to be just flying in circles then you could have witnessed young bees learning to recognise landmarks. They come out of the hive and fly in loops facing their hive so that they will be able to find their way home.

John also had a very useful practical tip on robbing from outside your house when you are trying to extract honey. If you have brought a super up to the back door but it has dripped honey and attracted bees then the worst thing you can do is remove it completely. The bees will have communicated the location of the honey and more and more will arrive to try to find it. However, if you leave just one frame with a small amount of honey the bees will take the honey but, when the frame is empty, they will go away. *Mary Staffurth*

Training New Beekeepers

Beekeeping in November

Your bees should by now be into the start of their quiescent stage with the winter bees emerging from pupation. As we have had warm weather, the bees have been out foraging for every last drop of nectar.

I have been gapping up my roadside hedge with hazel and hawthorn, the salt lorries kill off much of the previous year's plantings so I have planted larger shrubs this time. The jays, along with the mice and squirrels, are burying seeds all over the place. We have twelve walnut trees in different places and sweet chestnuts from one to three years old. I will replant these on our southern boundary although they will not fruit in my lifetime.

The Branch AGM is not far off, I hope as many beekeepers as possible will attend. I would like the meeting to discuss the education of new members.

As always we will be voting for committee members and officers. The committee is responsible for the general running of the Branch and the Chairman keeps order and has a casting vote.

Beekeeping Exam Study Group

Kent, Dover, Medway and Thanet Beekeepers are jointly offering a free to attend Zoom study group for members who wish to expand their knowledge of beekeeping for the BBKA "Module 1 – Honey Bee Management", possibly working towards the exam if wished. Study with others will be beneficial and enhance your chances of a credit if you decide to take the exam. KBKA, Dover & Thanet refund exam fees on successful completion.

The study group will run from 2nd November to 31st January on Tuesday evenings, from 19:00 to 21:00, followed by exam technique and revision sessions as needed. The exam date is 19th March 2022. Should you wish to take the exam, there is a £30 fee to pay.

Individual weeks will be led by two experienced beekeepers who will facilitate the 2 hour session between them, covering input on the criteria, followed by relevant exam questions from past papers.
