Laying the Foundations at Hilbert Road



Hot! Hot! Hot!

This month has been one of consolidation. The colonies are building up nicely and although this season there will not be a honey harvest, we are hopefully laying foundations for next year. The number of colonies has expanded from two at the beginning of the season to seven.

The warm and dry weather conditions may have contributed to a large number of swarming preparations this year with more than one split nucleus swarming again for no obvious reason.



This has helped to build up the numbers in the apiary quickly, although we will have to monitor closely next season in case we have particularly swarmy bees, something we may want to breed out with a queen rearing programme next year.

The hot weather has caused one colony to move outside as shown in the pictures. This was probably exacerbated by the placement of the varroa monitoring board just as the temperatures went up again.

My thanks to everyone who has supported my efforts at Hilbert Road especially Huw, who has been ensuring that all our infant colonies are fed while they build up.

Indoor Meetings are Back

Our meeting on September 20th is titled: An Introduction to Microscopy for Beekeepers. Earlier this year Bob Smith came to talk to us about nutrition in honeybees and his own studies of the pollen collected by his bees. This was followed by Vanessa Jones' talk on Varroa and Nosema. It therefore seemed appropriate that we should incorporate a session on the use of a microscope to examine for Nosema and for studying pollen. You are welcome to bring along your own sample of freshly dead bees to examine them for Nosema (about 30 are needed and the normal process for killing is to freeze them).

There are many pollen colour charts available, but colour alone is often inconclusive in identifying the pollen being collected by your bees. Far better to collect pollen from known sources locally and produce reference slides. We will demonstrate the procedure for producing stained pollen samples. There will be insufficient time for an in-depth study and instruction on microscopes, we will simply show their usefulness to beekeepers. Maybe, if there is interest, it could be the beginning our own microscopy group. Following our Branch Honey Show on October 1st (I mention it to everyone I meet so I couldn't pass another opportunity to add it to your consciousness) our October talk will be on Plants for Honeybees. Pam Hunter is a well-known speaker and has given many excellent talks, which are available on the BBKA website. "Why do bees have smelly feet?" was aimed at children and is the most intriguing. With a desire to ensure honeybees do not have a negative effect on the natural pollinator population, most beekeepers are planting for bees, but it can be difficult to know what you should choose for a comparatively small space. Pam's talk should help to guide you.
