October Talk

Our next evening meeting, due to take place on Tuesday October 17th, has been cancelled. The plan was to discuss the existential threat posed by the Asian Hornet. However, the neighbouring Orpington branch is planning a similar event which will be open to all KBKA members. It is due to take place towards the end of the month. Stress Free Bees

We were very lucky that Clive de Bruyn was able to deliver his lecture on healthy bees at our September meeting and we invited neighbouring branches to enable other beekeepers to benefit from Clive's experience. We pretty much had a full house to hear a clear and energetic presentation. Clive was very much of the opinion that stress is no better for bees than it is for beekeepers and, in some cases, beekeepers can be a major cause of stress. Clive said that, in his opinion, all pollinators were equally important to our ecosystems. In some ways he felt the honey bee had gained undue prominence thanks to celebrity endorsement to the detriment of many other insects, so we need to make our outdoor spaces a good place throughout the year for all pollinators.

As with any animal, health depends on nutrition, which for bees means pollen proteins and not just nectar. Clive is an advocate of a rich diversity of planting and emphasised the importance of a multitude of plants through the seasons with simple, accessible sources of pollen and nectar. He is also a fan of no-mow gardening to encourage native wild flower growth. On a personal note, I tried no-mow May this year, which morphed into no-mow June and July. The results were fascinating and the garden fared much better than expected during the hot dry spell with long grass.

In early spring when the queen starts laying, bees need considerable amounts of pollen to feed the developing brood. In suburban areas there are often sufficient spring bulbs to provide the pollen but, if your bees are on agricultural land with monoculture crops, you may need to provide a supplementary feed of pollen. When to feed is a function of your local environment so your knowledge of local weather patterns, farming practices and so on is key to correctly supporting the colonies through the spring.

One common hazard, however, is insecticide use. In suburban areas, you have absolutely no control over what, when and how your neighbours spray their gardens. As a general rule - don't spray, and try to have a grown up conversation with your neighbours about less invasive gardening techniques.

The living conditions of our bees are paramount to reducing stress levels, so Clive reminded us about looking properly during inspections: cool smoke, sufficient space, signs of a laying queen, signs of infections, signs of imminent swarming. Clive was clear that many beekeepers are their own worst enemies during inspections. He made the point that smooth, gentle handling of frames was essential, as was good apiary hygiene. Clive regularly cycles frames, he uses the queen year colours to mark the year a new frame has been inserted. When the foundation can no longer be used, the wax is removed and the frames sterilised by heating in a soda solution. On the subject of disease, Clive does not advocate a particular method of varroa control, but said you must monitor infestation levels and treat when needed.

So what was my take home message? I think what impressed me the most was that even with Clive's decades of experience he was still actively learning and allowing his techniques to evolve to meet the changing and challenging environment in which we live.
