AGM and Prize-Giving

The branch annual meeting and prize-giving took place in November. Chairman, Cliff Hayward, told members that this year's honey show, which was combined with a craft fair for the first time, had been so successful that it would continue in the same format in the future. He said that having a stall at events such as Sevenoaks Climate Fair had been a good way of talking about beekeeping with members of the public. He appealed for more beekeepers to volunteer to help out at such occasions next year.

Membership of the branch fell by 16 over the past year. Membership Secretary, Liz Birchenough, said that many of those who left were newer members who decided that beekeeping was not for them. At the same time 36 new people joined. Liz, who is also the treasurer, said that during the year the branch had to pay for tree felling at the Barrwood apiary. Tree surgeons spent five days dealing with several dangerous trees. Looking ahead she said there would not be so much income from sales of honey this year because the apiaries had produced less honey than in 2022.

Liz also raised the issue of attendance at the branch winter talks. She said that it might make sense to coordinate with neighbouring branches to share meetings. This is going to be discussed by the committee.

Sue Knights gave an update on the Asian Hornet problem and passed round some interesting, simple traps that are being developed. They consisted of an ordinary jar with a special top that would trap the hornets but allow other insects to escape.



Asian Hornet Update 2023



It is essential that all beekeepers and members of the public can identify Asian Hornets: the ID sheet, poster and postcard can be downloaded from BeeBase or ordered from the NBU office nbu@apha.gov.uk and it is the role of the team to increase public awareness and be on hand if the NBU call them. AHAT team members have given many talks on Asian Hornets through this year and more are planned for the coming year. We have distributed hundreds of leaflets and provided many monitoring traps.

All beekeepers are encouraged to keep an eye out for Asian Hornets in their apiaries. It is important to register on BeeBase and to ensure our contact and apiary details are up to date. There is a facility to record that you are using Asian Hornet monitoring at your apiary. If an email address is included this makes it super easy for individuals to receive alerts from the NBU when Asian Hornets are close by.

The best chance of being notified of anything is to register your monitoring traps, become an AHAT team member and provide contact details as this means the NBU can contact you if they need to.
